You may not recall "Closing Time," but many of you will know it when you hear the infectious melody and memorable hook "I know who I want to take me home."

You should always know who you want to take you home...as well as whom you do not want to take you home. When it comes to personal security of your laptop that applies as well. You must always be sure that nothing is ever stolen—hardware or data—as well as make sure nothing ever infects your machine, especially when traveling. Here are suggestions for personal device security as we enter the summer travel season.

- Close it up! We strongly recommend anytime you step away from your laptop to close the lid. This is the most basic yet vital step to ensuring no one has easy access to your key business and personal information. Sleep mode is recommended for stepping away when you will quickly return as it facilitates quick resumption of work. Hibernation mode is another option, but it takes longer to engage as well as resume.
- Keep your eye on the prize! Never venture out of sight of the machine. If you must do this at times, consider using a lockable cable to attach it to a permanent fixture. Another thing to consider if you must be away from the machine for extended periods is adding location tracking software to it. Never leave your laptop in your unattended vehicle. That is the most common way laptops are lost. If you must leave it, put it in the trunk but do it before and away from wherever you plan to park. If you must leave it while in a hotel, lock it in the hotel safe.
- Secure it all! Let's list it out for you: 1) Up-to-date anti-virus endpoint detection and response software in place on your machine; 2) Complex passwords in place and managed by a password management software application; 3) All security patches and updates in place for all key software; 4) Employ multi-factor authentication for

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access to your laptop as well as to all key applications; 5) Encrypted hard drive to make it harder for attackers to steal your information if perchance they gain access to it; 6) Backup all data on the machine and store it in the cloud and while you are at it, consider backing up the cloud backup; 7) Use a privacy screen to restrict viewing angles for when you are working in public; 8) If your laptop has a webcam get a physical cover on it so it not weaponized by the bad guys remotely; 9) Avoid public and free Wi-Fi. Use company provide VPN whenever possible.

Did You Invite Google on Vacation?

Can't recall where you had lunch yesterday? With its Timeline feature, Google probably knows where your whole family lunched—down to the GPS coordinates. Timeline for Android debuted in 2015 and in 2017 on Apple, but many still don't know it collects lots of information. Before your summer travels, review your privacy settings to see if the risk is worth the benefits.

What Google Maps Timeline Can See

With Google Maps Timeline, you can go back and see in detail where you were, when, and for how long. For example, the map will show you when you left work, got home and any pit stops you made. It can also tell if you traveled by bike, car, train or bus. This information may have been stored for YEARS! If you care about your privacy and prefer not to have your home address or daily jogging routine under Google's watchful eye, turn this feature OFF.

Pros And Cons

Under the guise of being a digital assistant, Google collects that information to make your life easier. At the same time, it's creating detailed profiles of all of us. While making our lives easier, it invites severe risks.

Upsides

- Find what's lost: Has your kid ever lost their phone during an errand spree and is not sure if they left it in the cart at Target or the bathroom at Cheesecake Factory? If your phone is connected to the Internet, Google Maps Timeline can retrace your steps.
- Peace of mind: Many parents gain peace of mind knowing where their children are and have been.
- In business: Employers can ensure employees working remotely are where they are supposed to be.
- Tailored ads: Because Google apps speak to each other, your ads are customized to your lifestyle.

Downsides

• Peeping Toms: Anyone getting hold of your account knows where you live, work and hang out and can

build a profile of you—profiles can be used in extortion or impersonation schemes.

- Not 100% accurate: You must be connected to the Internet and logged in to Google for feature to work.
- A lot less privacy: It's creepy when an app tracks and stores personal information!

How to Turn Tracking OFF

If you don't feel like having Google's eyes on your every move, follow these steps on one of your devices to update the settings from your computer:

- 1. Log in to your Google account
- 2. Tap your profile icon or initials, and select "Manage Your Google Account"
- 3. Click on "Data & Privacy"
- 4. Scroll to "History Settings" and select "Location History"
- 5. Pause your history
- 6. BONUS TIP: Delete your timeline history by going to Maps Timeline, "Manage Location History," and selecting an auto-delete option.

Tips for Using Google Timeline

If the benefits outweigh the risks for you or your family, do two things:

First, define a timeline to delete stored data. You can delete your location history after 3, 18 or 36 months—or keep it forever (which we don't recommend). Once you pick an option to remove the data, Google is legally obligated to delete it.

Second, use MFA on your devices and accounts so that even if someone finds your phone or hacks your account, they can't get in. Take control of your privacy and review this buried feature in Google's Maps app!
